## SIG-INTERNET 1/19/98 Brian Brodsky

The SIG-Internet meeting started around 8pm. The election for chairman resulted in Brian Brodsky becoming the new chairman.

Then we discussed possibilities for a permanent meeting location. People agreed to check into worthwhile locations and report back next month.

Brian Brodsky then showed examples of styles and cascading style sheets, which he explained are features of the new HTML 4.0 standard. The examples showed font manipulation, color manipulation and how they could be applied to individual items, text alignment, and paragraph indentation.

## Drive Image by Arthur Laramie

This is a great program. It is put on a CD by PowerQuest Corp. These are the same people who put together DriveCopy.

What is the difference between DriveCopy and Drive Image? Both copy the entire contents of one drive to another drive in the same computer. Drive Image also handles difficult situations in individual partitions or entire drives. It also creates and restores hard-drive image files, along with creating and storing hard-drive image files for backup, upgrades and system recovery.

Using its patent-pending SmartSector tech, Drive Image is much faster because it copies only used sectors.

There are two ways to run Drive Image: from a floppy drive or from the hard drive if you have booted DOS or MS-DOS mode.

Included are two additional utilities to simplify partition management. The programs are DriveMapper and MagicMover. DriveMapper allows you to alter drive letter assignments for partitions and your CD-ROM drive. MagicMover helps you move applications from one partition to another.

I sure have my problems sending out the column. I was unaware but many editors didn't receive it and those addresses were not bounced back to me. I have opened up a new service with Mindspring and my address there is, don't laugh,

dealsguy@mindspring.com. My aol addresses will still be good but start using the new one. I also have to learn how to use the new service myself.

I'm sorry that many editors thought I had quit writing, but I was unaware that the messages were going into that eternal bit bin in the sky. I will officially notify you if I am missing a month, or quitting. I am hoping to get editors to start downloading it from the APCUG BBS to insure their getting it.

### Still good:

• The Cirque keyboard deal is good 'til they're gone. Call 1-800-454-3375. I received a call from the people at Softcentre who produce the "Publicity" software. They wanted to acknowledge they had calls and thank me, so I'm passing the thanks on to you who bought it. During the conversation I learned the manual is available in printed form. Cost \$15. I was told it is actually on the disk in PDF form and so is the Acrobat reader. Good to know. You can always use the Acrobat reader anyway. Disk with printed manual is \$25.

You can also rotate text and arbitrarily shape outlined text. Shadows also! There is a lot to this software and it is still a deal for \$10 until March 31, 1998. Call them at 1-800-366-3311.

- I also heard from John Lehmann at GoldenRam who was a bit overwhelmed. It seems he didn't have enough disks to cover the calls. He wanted a copy of my write-up so he could talk to his boss. He told me that the same information is available on their web site as a download. It takes a while but is worth it. Visit http://www.goldenram.com to download. I only passed on what John told me at Comdex about the free disks. They had oodles of them there.
- The Delorme offer is good until March 30, 1998. Be sure to mention LM 123 when ordering. If there's a problem, ask for Andy Sturdevant. Order phone is 1-800-452-5931.
- I'm glad you liked the Media Graphics item. I talked to George Rice in the shipping warehouse. I have to say this guy didn't just fall off the turnip truck. When he started getting calls mentioning my column, he immediately put together a couple of inexpensive deals and many took advantage of them. It's bad when people grab up the freebies (cost of shipping only) en masse but don't buy things that cost more, so he fixed that. In fact, here are the deals he put together:

The disk for the cost of shipping, \$4.95, can be your choice of volume 1, 2 or 3; or get all three (30,000 graphics) for \$9.95 + \$4.95 S&H. If you also want to include the picture guides for all three, add \$10.95. Not bad. Call 1-800-598-2037 to order. Let's check out the deals that we have this month:

Boys and their toys (and girls too). I received a call from Voice Power Software to see if I would like to help announce a new product they are introducing and can hardly wait to tell

you about it. This product is "specialized" voice recognition software. They have two categories. One will launch your PowerPoint presentation and run it via your voice commands. The other will launch your web browser and take your voice commands for what you want it to do. How about that!!

This product will work with Internet Explorer or Netscape and works right out of the box with no voice training. You don't need a specialized mike either. Not only that but I was told it would also run your Eudora if you worked it right. I'm not much of an Internet person so I have little experience with a browser but it did the job when I tried it.

The problem was when my wife came into the room and saw me talking to my computer and no swearing. She just walked out scratching her head. Nobody came to get me so I guess it's OK. This product was meant for IE 3 and Netscape 3. It will do some but not all commands in version 4 of them. When it is updated, which will be soon, owners get to download the upgrade free.

Talk about a toy; my friend who also tried it says this is space age stuff! There's more! The price is only \$24.95 + shipping. That's cheap for having fun. It's \$24.95 also for the PowerPoint voice recognition softwarening the presentation. Only the length of your mike cord restricts you, or your cordless mike if you try that. I don't think they have a Mac version but you could ask.

You can also visit their web site at www.voisys.com for more information or simply call them at 1-800-425-8118 to order. Mention my column to get the discounted price. It's only \$5 off but

every buck helps. Alternate phone is 1-410-226-5310. I believe you can also order from the web site so don't forget to mention the column there also. One problem with all this space age stuff... I'll hate it when my computer starts cussing back at me.

## Learning the ropes (of software):

I've been playing with a CD that is trying to teach me some things about "Word 95" and while I'm a slow learner, it really takes me by the hand. "Quest 2000" offers learning CDs in several categories. It not only has video and sound but often has the button you want circled in red. When it tells you to pick something off a certain menu, that something is already highlighted.

Should you make a mistake, you are prompted first by an audio tone, then by a flashing hot spot showing exactly where to click. If unsuccessful after three attempts (too dumb to click the button it finally shows you) it will continue that part of the session automatically without any insults like mine. Besides the video, there is a box with the instructions in it to read.

So far I have been through tables, merging and setting up a form letter where I was tutored to perform the tasks. I ran it on my 486 with 8 megs of RAM and the 4X CD ROM drive. It ran OK but synchronization for the lips and voice was off. My AMD K5 166 with a 24X drive worked fine. It will automatically start (Win95) when you insert your CD unless you have that feature tuned off in Windows 95.

You need not have the actual software on your machine to run the tutorial CD. I ran mine right off the CD. They have other nice products coming that they may discount for my

column such as training over the Internet with streaming video.

The learning CDs in the catalogue were mostly for Microsoft products (Office 97, Outlook and FrontPage 97 included). Also Paradox. Individual software CDs run \$49.95 retail while office suite CDs start at \$119. They have offered my readers a 20% discount if you mention the column. Not a bad discount and the product worked fine for me. Call 1-800-528-0380 or 1-941-727-1064 for a catalogue or to order. I wonder if they will have one on how to be polite to your computer when it crashes. When I tried that, I hit my head on my monitor when I bowed. It crashed again later anyway. Make your brain bulge with

Windows 95 info: I saw these at Comdex and liked them. They are just the ticket for a klutz such as myself. The one handed me at Comdex is a four-page (letter size pages) plastic-coated guide to things you want to know about Windows 95.

The front page has a screen shot of your desktop with the start menu up and the explorer window open. Every part of all those screens has a pointer with info of what it is and does. On the lower part is a section for "new features of Windows 95" with more information.

The second page is titled "Key Windows 95 Components." Sections there are: Windows keyboard and utilities; Key system desktop icons; System Tools; New & improved accessories; and the control panel.

Third page is all about The Explorer; Basic explorer operation and key explorer menus.

The fourth page is titled "Customizing Windows 95." Sections are:

changing start and taskbar; display properties; shortcut properties; and multiple desktops.

There's not much to this four-page plastic-coated item but it contains a wealth of information at your fingertips. Many titles are Microsoft products but I noticed other interesting titles: "C" language; Computer Science; HTML; Internet; Java; Lotus 123; Internet Explorer 4; NetScape Navigator (reg & gold); NetScape Communicator 4; Quicken; Word-Perfect 6,7,8; and even Mac OS 8.

There are also college titles for various subjects. The retail is from \$2.95 to \$4.95. They will give a discount of 20% if you mention the column and you must pay postage. I weighed mine + a manila envelope and 78 cents should cover it. I wondered if they would come out with one on "explaining and customizing a wife" but was afraid to ask.

Ask prices for what you want in particular. It took my eye and I'm passing it on to you. Call BarCharts Inc. at 1-800-226-7799 ext. 20 to order or for more info. I talked to Mr. Taylor if you have a problem. Maybe a club could buy them in bulk and use them for a fund-raiser although they said the discount is the same.

## ON THE ROAD by Bill Gates review by Dr. Wm. Agnew

This is a book that everyone with a personal computer should read—in self-defense if for no other reason. It offers a good idea of what is going to obsolete your computer, and what great opportunities for a better computer lifestyle is coming. Bill Gates, perhaps better than anyone in the world, is in a position to know, and he tells us in a completely engaging manner.

The book really has two aspects that make it worthwhile. First is the history and prognosis of personal computer technology, and second is what it reveals of Bill Gates himself. Bill claims that this book is in no way an autobiography, even though he tells a bit in the first chapter about his development from a thirteen year old high school computer kid, through his leaving Harvard as a sophomore, starting a two-man Microsoft company with Paul Allen, and finally up to his position today as the world's richest computer guru.

The book engages the reader particularly because of the personality (real or contrived) of Bill Gates, the curly-headed boy with the mind as big as the world. You will find no trace of arrogance in this book. His personality is one that forces you to refer to him as Bill, not Mr. Gates. He manages to use references to James Burke, Saint-Exupéry, da Vinci, Stephen Hawking, John Irving, David Halberstein, *La Dolce Vita*, Einstein, Spielberg, Jane Austen, Le Corbusier, Seurat's *Bathers at Asniéres*, Matisse, Mozart, Jimi Hendrix, and the Beatles—as if

he knew them all well, but with no sign of elitism. He also refers to Taco Bell, *Queen for a Day*, *Nightline*, the O.J. Simpson chase, and *Recreational Skier*. He claims to go to the movies about once a week, which is amazing in his position (I can't imagine that there are 52 movies a year that are worth his time), but he specifically mentions *Forrest Gump*, *The Bridge on the River Kwai*, *Top Gun*, *Jurassic Park*, *The Lion King*, *and The Little Mermaid*. Perhaps he does go every week.

Bill's many-million dollar house gets a fair description, at least its computer content, which is pervasive. But Bill says it's all an experiment in future applications. He predicts we too will have many of these applications in our homes in the future.

All in all, Bill seems to be a lot like us—that is we relatively well-to-do suburbanites who live comfortably and go to the movies and watch television, and have personal computers. That's not like the majority in the world, but he, like we, does have a broad understanding of the world and human nature and can guess pretty well how it will respond to new developments in computer technology.

Bill's principal message, of course, is that the fast-changing computer technology is going to bring us fantastic new opportunities to improve our lifestyle—comparable to the changes rendered by the industrial revolution, the automobile, TV, and the silicon chip. And the best is yet to come; if you think today's personal computers are revolutionary, you haven't seen nothin'. He says we are only at the beginning.

He traces the development of

computers from their beginning to today with some interesting critiques of business competition and mistakes by such as IBM and Apple. And he arrives at the Information Highway, the sine qua non of this wondrous new computer world that we are all going to live in. The highway will be much like the Internet today, except a fiber optic cable will extend to each home, school, and office and connect to a "set-top" box sitting on an appliance like a TV set. However, the broad band of the fiber optic cable will permit the TV, telephone, and computer all to be connected through it; and it will all be interactive. The possibilities that this opens up for communication and entertainment in the home I leave for the readers to discover for themselves in Bill's book. He describes them all with great enthusiasm. He also discusses the implications for business—a massive marketplace—and education—"the best investment."

Bill's world view of the Information Highway is expressed in this quotation: "We are all created equal in the virtual world, and we can use this equality to help address some of the sociological problems that society has yet to solve in the physical world... the gap between the have and have-not nations will diminish... The information highway is going to break down the boundaries and may promote a world culture."

There are some problem issues that Bill says we must overcome, like privacy, possible addiction, crashes in the system, premature political regulation, and over-attention to easily obtained public polls. A concept Bill mentions with both positive and negative implications is the "documented life." Your wallet PC will be able to produce the "ultimate diary and autobiography... a single tape costing a few dollars [that] could hold recordings of all the conversations an individual has over the course of a decade or possibly even a lifetime—depending on how talkative he is."

Bill Gates' message to the reader is: Hold onto your hat!  $\sqrt{\phantom{a}}$ 

## Usenet News Groups and Search Program to Find the Right Ones

What are Usenet News Groups?

For the average computer user, connection to the Internet means access to e-mail and the World Wide Web (WWW). E-mail lets you communicate with individuals or groups, while the WWW lets you display prearranged information prepared by individuals and/or organizations, allowing for a certain amount of interaction. A third way to communicate with the world on the Internet, less popular but equally important, is through Usenet news groups.

Usenet is somewhat akin to the Citizen Band radio or a Bulletin Board, except that your audience is worldwide and can be targeted to narrow groups of common interest. If you need information on a very specific subject, the easiest way to find answers is to address a specific Usenet news group.

An Internet provider stores Usenet traffic of selected news groups on a local computer accessible to its subscribers. Smaller Internet providers

may contract with a remote Usenet server. Usenet servers often have the word "news" as part of their name, e.g. news.injersey.com for subscribers to injersey.com, my Internet service provider. Some large organizations such as Microsoft and Netscape provide their own news servers, which carry only selected news groups related to their business, but are freely accessible to the public.

My Recent Experiences with Usenet I gave my old Kenwood shortwave receiver to my daughter, who did not have much use for it, so I advertised it in rec.radio.shortwave and got several offers. I sold the radio for over \$200 within a week. By reading messages in that group, I also found out that WNYE-FM in New York carries my favorite BBC World Service programs every night.

Similarly, after my wife Ruth bought a copy of Adobe Photoshop at a computer show and I won another copy at PC Expo in New York, we were able to sell the extra copy to a fellow in England by advertising it in the Usenet news group comp.graphics.apps.photoshop.

In 1996, while planning a short trip to Poland, I posted a message in Polish asking for travel advice in the news group soc.culture.polish. Shortly I received a dozen answers from Poland, Canada and the USA. I was told about ATM machines (just a few and geared to local banks), taxi cabs (if hail one on the street, you will be ripped off, call 919 for an honest driver), and the cost of gasoline for our rented car (1.50 zloty/liter).

What's Out There/How To Find It My Internet Usenet server carries over 17,000 news groups. Universities typically carry 2,000 to 5,000 groups. Subjects range from the ridiculous to the sublime. There's one dedicated to the TV program, NYPD Blue (alt.tv.nypd-blue), and another dealing with numerical analysis (sci.math.num-analysis). There is one dedicated to prostitutes in Tijuana, and many groups carry all kinds of pictures.

Search for specific groups with the tin/rtin Unix program if you have a shell account, or with various Windows programs such as Free Agent. You can access specific news groups with Explorer, most versions of Netscape (except for the unbundled 4.04), and Netscape Communicator. Make sure your software is correctly configured to access your Usenet news server. You can enter the name of a specific news group as a bookmark preceded by "news:" For example, the URL for the bookmark for the NYPD news group would be news:alt.tv.nypd-blue.

When connected to the Internet, you can read messages posted in a news group, you can answer postings with a follow-up, you can reply to a message via e-mail, or you can post a new message. Netscape 2.0 and later and Communicator will decode and display GIF and JPG graphics included in news group messages.

My son wrote two programs in PERL which allow me to download from my news server the names, descriptions and activity figures for all Usenet groups available from that server. I combined this information into a database file USENET.DBF with nearly 18,000 records, one record per news group. Then I wrote a search program USENET.EXE, which will search the database for keywords. For example, if you are interested in

modems, you enter the word "modem" and get a listing of all Usenet groups which have the word "modem" in their name or description. Each selection shows the name of the group, description of the group if available, activity of that group, and if the group is moderated, (many serious news groups are moderated). This information is invaluable, as you will immediately find the worthwhile groups, those with high activity figures.

The files USENET.DBF and USE-NET.EXE are included on a CD in my recently published book, Ultimate Modem Handbook (Prentice Hall, November 1997). For more information about the book, visit the Prentice Hall web page http://www.phptr.com and search for "modem." If you don't have the book and are interested in Usenet news groups, send me an e-mail message. I will e-mail to you the files combined into USENET.ZIP (392K) as attachment. You run the program off-line in a DOS window. After trying the program, please send me your comments. SIG-MAC MEETING by Dr. Wm. Agnew

Beth Fordyce opened the meeting at 2:48 p.m. with eleven people present. She announced the February meeting would be a joint meeting with SIG-IBM, with Jim Rillings as the speaker discussing the use of computers in intelligent vehicle/highway systems. The March meeting will begin a series of presentations by Harold Balmer on ClarisWorks. There will be no April meeting because of Easter (the campus is closed). Coming, perhaps in May will be a discussion on running Windows on a Mac.

Beth passed out free copies of Speed Doubler, Connectix Video Phone, and Connectix PhotoMate to those who wanted them. Then an election was held, and Beth was elected Chairman of SIG-Mac by acclamation.

It was announced that SIG-Mac shareware copy sessions were going to be terminated except when there was a request for a specific item, or if Phyllis decided something was so good that everyone needed to have it. The surprise program for the meeting was Phyllis Evans' demonstration of a comedy disk from Multimediocrity Theater. The first part was the Billmo Doll, a super-aggressive marketing action toy that looked a bit like Bill Gates. The second was a takeoff on a Technical Support phone call: Press 2 for courtesy at \$4/min.; Press 3 for English at \$5/min.; Press 5 to send pizza to the tech support staff; Press 6 for silence at 50¢/min.; Press 8 for totally rude support at \$8/min.; etc. The question and answer session included the following answers: 1. URL = Uniform Resource Locator, and address on the Internet. 2. To locate individuals for a genealogy, Switchboard helps, but no one knew another source. Perhaps try the Detroit Public Library. [Another source, from the Mormons: Personal Ancestral File v2.3.1, from Family History Department, 50 East North Temple St., Salt Lake City, UT 84150, \$35, 366 pages of documentation. See page 35 October 1997 issue DATA BUS, for review. Ed.] 3. Word 5 can be installed on Mac 6500, 7000, and 8000 machines, but it requires special procedures that you might get from technical support. 4. EPS = Encapsulated Postscript, a format for graphics that requires a Postscript printer for printing. Phyllis says she doesn't use it any more.

- Technical dictionaries for computer terms are available in several books, including MacBible, Jargon, and Secrets.
- 6. "Bandwidth" refers to the capacity of a communication line to transmit and process lots of information. It is analogous to the diameter of a pipe carrying water.
- 7. "Default" is the fallback position of a computer. It is the automatic configuration that a computer goes to if you haven't requested anything else. It is normally set by the manufacturer, but you can go in and change it if you want to.
- 8. Norton Utilities may not make a permanent hard disk correction if you run Norton Utilities from that same hard disk. It's best to boot the computer from Norton Utilities CD (press "C" when starting), then do Disk Doctor from the Norton CD.
- 9. Symptoms of backup battery failure may be: date and time settings slow down or speed up; monitor loses color; startup problems; mouse slows; etc. You shouldn't wait long to replace it. There seem to be a lot of batteries failing these days; perhaps Apple bought a lot at once that are just reaching their old age. You can change the battery easily yourself, and they currently cost about \$20 (perhaps cheaper at Radio Shack).
- 10. If you should lose just one color on your monitor (e.g., red), check the monitor cord to make sure it is well connected.
- 11. Virtual Memory reserves a portion of your hard disk for temporary memory. If you are short of space on the hard disk, you may want to turn virtual memory off (in the control panel). On the other hand if your

RAM is not large enough to run some programs, you can turn Virtual Memory on and perhaps double the available memory.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:05pm, and Mac members beat the IBM folks to the social period refreshments. (Isn't it great to have an efficient chairman?)  $\sqrt{\phantom{a}}$

## Power Macintosh: Meaning of Error Type 11

## from TechInfoLibrary

Iget an error Type 11 on my Power Macintosh computer when a program crashes. I never got this error on my 68k based Macintosh computers. Is this a new error for the Power Macintosh?

#### DISCUSSION:

A Type 11 error is listed as a hardware exception error. However, as with all Macintosh Type xx errors, they usually do not identify a particular software or hardware component error. Type xx errors are more general in nature.

You may see more Type 11 errors on a Power Macintosh computer because of problems with the software-based 68k emulator. The emulator allows the RISC processor to run older Macintosh software. If the emulator gets corrupted while loading into RAM, then some of the failures caused by this are reported as Type 11 or Hardware Exception

errors. The emulator can get corrupted by either incompatible software or faulty hardware.

### **Troubleshooting Type 11 Errors**

When troubleshooting Type 11 errors, always eliminate software problems first, then check the hardware.

To troubleshoot the problem, follow these steps:

- **Step 1**: Upgrade your hard disk drivers and system software to the latest versions available.
- **Step 2**: Contact the software vendor for compatibility information if the problem only occurs in one application, and you can reproduce it consistently.
- Step 3:Turn off all extensions and control panels if the error occurs in an application that is fully compatible with a Power Macintosh computer. Check the application again. If the problem goes away, then troubleshoot your extensions, control panels or fonts. Large numbers of fonts can cause similar errors, troubleshoot by moving them from the Fonts folder to another folder. If you still have problems, follow Step 4.
- **Step 4**:Perform a clean installation of the system software, then test the system performance for a few days. If the problems continue, particularly in the Finder, there may be an issue with your Apple or non-Apple hardware.
- Step 5: Disconnect any external or internal SCSI devices that may have been added (or exchanged for the original Apple hardware) and continue testing. Since SCSI device drivers load into memory when the Macintosh is turned on, they can generate conflicts similar to extension conflicts. If you are using a non-Apple formatting utility, contact the vendor of the utility for compatibility information. Removing internal SCSI devices is best performed by an Apple-authorized service provider.
- **Step 6**: Remove any extra third-party RAM and test. This is best performed by an Appleauthorized service provider. Also verify that you are not using composite RAM.
- **Step 7**: Remove Level 2 Cache RAM, if present, and test.

If you continue to get Type 11 errors using a clean version of the system software without any third-party hardware attached (including internal or external SCSI devices, additional RAM, or Level 2 cache RAM), you need to have your computer serviced by an Apple-authorized service provider.


